Student Perspective: Auburn Police Department

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Part 1: Background

Police in Auburn

The Auburn, Alabama Police Department in Lee County is well known among their community for their enforcement of the laws and their commitment to keeping the Auburn Tigers safe. Auburn is home of Auburn University and the Auburn Football Team, better known as the Auburn Tigers. As a member of the SEC, Southeastern Conference, Auburn is a well-traveled city and brings in much tourism and fans during the fall season. Auburn is also home to 64,054 people, many of which are students, athletes, families, and business owners. Because of the larger population and attraction, Auburn is a city that requires a lot of protection.

Since Auburn does need a lot of policing and protection, especially on campus, there is also a need for money to pay for the AUPD's service. For police department in the city of Auburn, the city's budget has risen in last decade by over \$2 million to continue funding. In 2010, the Auburn police department spent \$10,987,000 on their equipment, salaries, bills, etc. for the year. In 2019, the Auburn police department spent \$12,844,000 on the same expenses.

Auburn P.D. has a location on campus, located next to the village dorms and Raymond J. Harbert College of Business. The AUPD also has staffed the building with 39 sworn law enforcement officers, as well as investigative, narcotics, and Community Services Sections of the Police Division

Located in the Auburn University Student Center, Safe Harbor is a safe place for those who have experienced power-based personal violence including dating/domestic violence, sexual assault, stalking, or harassment. This organization provides help with crisis response, support, advocacy, information, and referrals for victims but is not a shelter. Safe place works hand-in-hand with the Auburn police on and off campus to ensure the safety of students. Safe Harbor is different from usual safe places by offering the resources needed to help victims in their recovery instead of supplying a safe place for victims to stay the night.

Part 4: Story Ideas

Story 1)

The Auburn Police Department in Auburn, Alabama has a job to protect and serve their community, but what if their community is filled with college athletes playing on an SEC team? That must be a difficult task for anyone to preform, but for Auburn P.D., it just means they need more money. I could do a story on the amount of money given to the A.P.D. annually and better understand how they use their funds to protect and serve. This could result back to a conversation about sexual assault victims in Auburn or their employee's pension, both are interesting topics of concern. I have two sources, one that worked with the A.P.D. and another that works with Opelika's police that could guide me through their mindsets at the stations. I could also interview their chief of police and see how their funds are used and if there is ever a surplus. I can also discuss their new building and how long that plan was in the works. This could also call for a discussion about healthcare and housing issues in the city of Auburn, leading to other interviews with new sources.

Story 2)

Sexual assault is a problem on any college campus, but at any campus, four reports in less than two weeks calls for immediate action. At Auburn University, there were four separate reports

over the course of two weeks of sexual assault on and off campus. Some of the allegations were more serve than other, but never less important. Auburn PD has not put out any warrants, done any further questioning, or contacted two of the four victims. I could interview those two victims and create a story based around Auburn's compliance with sexual assault allegations. This would point me to the police department and the university, so interviewing a professor, counselor, or dean would be great for the story. This has been an issue for students for years but has now come to a head and called for full action and consequences from the authorities and the university itself. Interviewing students would also give me more insight into how female students safety in Auburn and on campus.
